We were supposed to pluck the long green beans and 2

put them in our pails. When a bucket was full, we emptied the beans into big clean burlap sacks. We called these bags gumysacks. A gumysack could hold about 70 pounds of beans. Most days, we children each picked one bag full. We got paid for this work. Uncle John weighed the sacks at the end of the day. He deducted two pounds for the weight of the sack. Aunt Wanda figured out how much we had earned and paid us three cents a nound. pound.
